

## Balloon releases at services



Releasing balloons at Funeral or Memorial Services is discouraged and may be illegal, pending on your state or territory. Please consider other environmentally friendly tributes for your loved ones.

Concerns generally relate harming marine life and aircrafts.

A <u>2016 CSIRO study</u> identified balloons among the top three most harmful pollutants threatening marine wildlife, along with <u>plastic bags</u> and bottles.

NSW New South Wales balloon releases

It is illegal to release 20 or more gas-inflated balloons at or about the same time. The balloons should not have any attachments. On-the-spot fines can be given and penalties are much higher

if over 100 balloons are released.
